Minutes of April Board Meeting:

The board meeting of the Telaraña Guild was called to order by President Betz Frederick at 7:00 pm on April 25, 2012. In attendance were Betz Frederick, Paul McLemore, Linda Wade, Nancy Wanek, Jean Doig, Sharie Monsam, Debi Deadmond, Charlotte Weber, Cindy Reynolds, Karen Stromberg, Sharon Erb, Elly Wienel and Joy Lange.

A great deal of discussion took place concerning workshop profits in the future. Considerations were to refund part of the tuition to class participants in the case of higher than expected profits, or to use those profits to focus on building our treasury, giving us the ability to acquire items that would help to develop a broader knowledge base for all members and to provide a cushion of sustainability for leaner times. It was decided that a formal policy was not necessary at this time, but may be revisited in the future.

A decision was made to develop a standard contract for instructors of workshops or classes. Also it was agreed that non-members will pay an additional fee for workshops.

Treasurer: We now have a balance of \$4572.21.

Secretary: The membership voted unanimously at the official annual meeting to accept the Constitution and By Laws changes and approve the slate of officers for 2012/2013.

Membership: We now have 90 members.

Programs: Jean Doig stated that for the May dinner meeting the doors will open at 6:00pm. Dinner will be at 6:30. The silent auction will be for donated items, but there will be "for sale" items also.

SUMMER WORKSHOP

Spinning for Lace

Date: Wednesday, June 6, 2012 in Mesa to wash individual Merino locks from a fleece.

Date: Saturday, June 9, 2012 at Mary Snyder's home in Payson to spin and ply the washed locks.

Our teacher will be Margaret Stove via the video, "**Spinning for Lace, Tried and True Methods for Spinning Fine Yarns from Merino and More**". Margaret Stove demonstrates washing individual Merino locks one at a time, spinning the washed locks from the tip to the cut end, and plying techniques to produce a thin, soft and lofty, semi-woolen yarn. For locks, we have two, very fine, colored, New Zealand fleeces; one gray, the second Moorit. You will need either a spinning wheel that can be adjusted for a very loose take-up or a supported spindle. The fibers are spun with some fibers crossing the width

of the yarn. Consequently, a drop spindle is not recommended, as its weight will likely draft the fibers parallel with the take-up.

The format for the class is to watch the washing part of the video, then wash locks here in Mesa on **Wednesday** night. On **Saturday**, we will meet in Payson about 9:30 to continue the video, and spin our locks. We will take a break for a pot luck salad lunch, and then continue with the video on plying in the afternoon. Class size is limited to 12, in order to be able to see the video.

Cost: Betz bought the fleeces in New Zealand from the president of the colored wool growers association. Both of them are rated at over 95 points out of 100. We will reimburse her for the cost of the wool, which is TBD. I still need to divide and weigh the wool, which will be packaged in 2-4 oz. lots.

Did You Know...?

Beweave It!

[Spider silk](#) is strong as high grade steel, can withstand extreme temperatures, and is incredibly light—a single strand of spider silk long enough to circle the globe would weigh only 18 oz.

Unfortunately, spiders can't be "farmed" because their silk is hard to harvest, and because spiders are territorial and cannibalistic. But University of Wyoming professor Don Jarvis and Utah State University professor Randy Lewis [recently announced](#) that they've successfully bred silkworms to produce silk that is 5% spider silk. This new natural polymer, dubbed "monster silk," is produced by inserting spider genes into silkworm eggs and breeding the offspring together to create a generation of silkworms that have the capability to produce spider silk. If silkworms can eventually be bred to produce 100% spider silk, commercially harvested spider silk could be used for applications such as ultra-light airplane parts or body armor that's light and soft as silk and stronger than Kevlar.

Telaraña Library - New Video: Jason Collingwood's , **Rugweaving: Block Weaves and Shaft Switching** – now in our library!

This comprehensive video workshop covers all information needed to weave a successful weft-faced rug. Jason begins with a discussion on tools, materials and the proper way to sit at your loom. He then provides step-by-step instructions on how to warp your loom. He covers beaming for high tension, ensuring neat and durable selvages by packing the selvages. Jason shows different twinings for the beginning of your piece and beautiful fringes to finish your rug. You will learn to create blocks of color using standard threading and then how to change the placement of blocks to place color and alter the design. Jason demonstrates on a 4-harness jack loom how to adapt any loom to shaft switching, a method of manipulating warp threads to allow almost unlimited possibilities of color placement. Jason shows inspiring examples while he explains how to create and weave a beautiful rug. This DVD is a great resource to reinforce what we learned in his recent workshop for Telaraña. A weaver that hasn't had Jason's workshop will easily understand his rug weaving techniques. The DVD was filmed in 1998 but is still up to date with his teaching. The DVD is 134 minutes.

HGA's Convergence® 2012 Long Beach conference will be held July 15-21, 2012, Long Beach, California, USA.

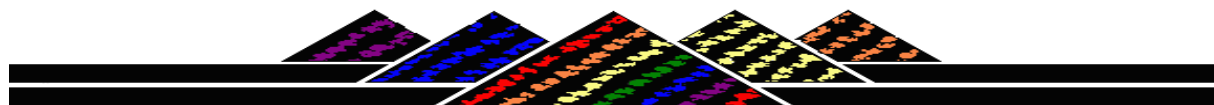
The conference will take place at the [Long Beach Convention Center](#) and surrounding locations in downtown Long Beach.
