## **Scholarships**

The number and quality of online workshops has increased and are eligible for scholarship funds with the same qualifiers as in-person workshops. Applications for scholarship funds are due December 31, 2023. You can give the application to Trudy Johnson at a meeting or send it by email or snail mail.

1. Applicant must be current with their membership dues and have been a member for the full previous guild year.

2. Workshop must be taken during the Guild year in which the scholarship is awarded.

3. Recipients are expected to share their new knowledge with the Guild in some way, i.e., a short program, demonstration or workshop focusing on how newly learned material will be/was applied.

4. Application is specific to the workshop listed.

5. The Karen Zorn Memorial Scholarship will distribute a maximum of \$160 per year but the recipient cannot receive more than the cost of the workshop or class. It is available to help members attend workshops, seminars and classes that will further their fiber arts skills.

Supplies for hands-on portion: Scissors, and a minimum of six paint chips (the kind from a hardware store pain department)

Does incorporating more color into your projects appeal to you, but leaves you feeling a little intimidated? Do you long to break out of a color rut? Do you have yarns in your stash that are less than exciting? In this seminar, a variety of tools and techniques will be covered to assist you in exploring different ways of incorporating color into your projects and give you more confidence in discovering new color horizons.

Robyn Spady was introduced to handweaving as a baby with her handwoven baby blanket woven by her great-grandmother. Inspired by for over 50 years. She completed HGA's Certificate of Excellence in Handweaving (COE-W) in 2004 with the specialized study Loom-controlled Stitched Double Cloth. Robyn is fascinated by the infinite possibilities of crossing threads and loves coming up with new ideas to create fabric and transform it into something new and exciting. She is committed to turning the weaving world onto double-faced fabrics, four-shaft weaves, uncommon and advanced weave structures, and passementerie techniques. # Weaving a Transparency with Bobbie Irwin

Friday – Sunday, March 8-10, 2024, 9am

Cost: \$190 Registration—click here

Limit: 12 people minimum and 14 maximum

Location: Mesa Historical Museum, 2345 N. Horne, Mesa, AZ 85203

Description - Using a variety of inlay techniques, create pictorial patterns on an open weave background. Transparencies have pattern diversity of tapestry, but are easier, faster, and more economical. Transparency's interaction with light gives added dimension. You'll weave two introductory samplers on a linen warp to try numerous inlay techniques and build confidence in conquering common design challenges. You then design and weave your own patterns no artistic skill required). Unorthodox materials and methods are demonstrated/discussed in class, and in longer classes, you may choose to overshot inlay, a fishing line warp, or start a wool scarf in transparency techniques.

4 – shaft looms, 3 days. For all experience levels, including beginners who are familiar with their equipment and basic weaving techniques.

ABOUT BOBBIE IRWIN: I started teaching weaving on a local level in 1976, long before I knew much about weaving, and I've offered classes and programs for guilds, conferences, craft schools, shops, and other venues since 1986. Or me teaching is about sharing. When something exciting happens while I'm weaving, I just can't wait to share it with other weavers! I am thrilled if I can pass along my enthusiasm and see someone go on to create something ar finer than I have done myself. # Help Wanted

What do you enjoy about being a member of our Guild? Programs? workshops? study groups? How about the annual Guild Sale? Or maybe just having a support group of like-minded fiber enthusiasts.

These are all reasons to join our guild, but none of these things just happen. It takes volunteers and committees and a board to be sure we have a place to meet and coordinate the events and activities.

The Guild is only strong and vibrant with the participation of you, the members. Perhaps you've been tapped in the past to chair a committee and your knee-jerk reaction was "no, I can't" or "no time". To show you that committing for a position is not as demanding as you might think, I'm going to highlight a few of the board/committee positions and what is required. Board/committee members are expected to attend a monthly board meeting, but these are conducted in the evening on zoom and only last 1.5 - 2 hours. In the next newsletter, I'll highlight other positions. Our nominating committee convenes in January to start lining up our board for the next guild year.

**Newsletter Editor**: Responsible for compiling and editing the newspaper during active months of the Guild year (September – May). You are not responsible for writing the articles in the newsletter; the board and members submit articles, and you edit and format the info. Some of the info carries forward from month to month. It does not require extensive computer skills or a lot of your time. It is distributed by email, with only a few printed copies going by snail mail. You don't have to be a year- round resident. Our present and last editors don't live in Arizona at all!

**Programs Chairman**: Lines up presenters and coordinates their schedules and requirements (such as projector). Some of our programs are in-person and some are virtual. Some presenters may be nationally known; some may be our very own members. Not every meeting has a program. Traditionally, our September meeting is a "welcome back, what-have -you-been-doing" get-together. December and May are potlucks with perhaps a short presentation of some sort. So, out of 9 meetings, only 6 or 7 have a formal program. This position may be combined with the Vice President position, since the Vice President has no defined responsibilities other than stepping in when the President is not present.

Secretary's Report: Minutes of September 27, 2023 had been received and reviewed. No corrections were required. Lee moved and members approved the September board meeting minutes.

*Treasurer's Report: Cindy's report sent to all board members showed guild operating balance at \$10,860.03 plus the \$700 Zorn Scholarship fund. 76 members dues were paid and 4 promised.* 

Linda pointed out that Hospitality and Exhibit committees were over their budget. By laws require approval. Lee sent out a text for the Executive Committee to approve the cost overrun of these committees. Executive Committee approved.

#### Old Business:

Upcycle Challenge ends January 1, 2024. Members are encouraged to bring upcycle items to November and/or December guild meetings to share at Show and Tell.

Maureen has 15 or 16 items to submit to the Mayo Clinic Pharmacy Exhibit. The submission is due November 10. Items chosen will be gathered and handed over together. The exhibition runs from December 13 to March 13.

Linda Wade will write up a summary of duties for Board and Committee members for the newsletter.

Current members may also give a short explanation of their role at guild meetings. These summaries will help all guild members understand the reasonable work load of board and committee positions and will encourage others to take on these roles. Someone willing to take photos at meetings and events is still needed. Let Lee know if you are interested.

Library – Karen has added more books to our library. She will give some suggested titles for borrowing

books that may give ideas and instruction for holiday items.

Membership – Karla concurred with Cindy's 80 member guild numbers. She plans to send letters to new members and is also looking at ways to increase membership.
