






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Mayo Clinic Exhibition Update



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TAMING OF THE HUE



She completed HGA's Certificate of Excellence in Handweaving (COE-W) in 2004 with the specialized study Loom-controlled Stitched Double Cloth. Robyn is fascinated by the infinite possibilities of crossing threads and loves coming up with new ideas to create fabric and transform it into something new and exciting. She is committed to turning the weaving world onto double-faced fabrics, four-shaft weaves, uncommon and advanced weave structures, and passementerie techniques. Weaving a Transparency with Bobbie Irwin

Friday - Sunday, March 8-10, 2024, 9am

Cost: \$190 Registration—click here

Limit: 12 people minimum and 14 maximum

Location: Mesa Historical Museum, 2345 N. Horne, Mesa, AZ 85203

Description - Using a variety of inlay techniques, create pictorial patterns on an open weave background. Transparencies have pattern diversity of tapestry, but are easier, faster, and more economical. Transparency's interaction with light gives added dimension. You'll weave two introductory samplers on a linen warp to try numerous inlay techniques and build confidence in conquering common design challenges. You then design and weave your own patterns no artistic skill required). Unorthodox materials and methods are demonstrated/discussed in class, and in longer classes, you may choose to overshot inlay, a fishing line warp, or start a wool scarf in transparency techniques.

4 – shaft looms, 3 days. For all experience levels, including beginners who are familiar with their equipment and basic weaving techniques.

ABOUT BOBBIE IRWIN: I started teaching weaving on a local level in 1976, long before I knew much about weaving, and I've offered classes and programs for guilds, conferences, craft schools, shops, and other venues since 1986. Or me teaching is about sharing. When something exciting happens while I'm weaving, I just can't wait to share it with other weavers! I am thrilled if I can pass along my enthusiasm and see someone go on to create something ar finer than I have done myself. 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Scholarships


The number and quality of online workshops has increased and are eligible for scholarship funds with the same qualifiers as in-person workshops. Applications for scholarship funds are due December 31, 2023. You can give the application to Trudy Johnson at a meeting or send it by email or snail mail.

- 1. Applicant must be current with their membership dues and have been a member for the full previous guild year.
- 2. Workshop must be taken during the Guild year in which the scholarship is awarded.
- 3. Recipients are expected to share their new knowledge with the Guild in some way, i.e., a short program, demonstration or workshop focusing on how newly learned material will be/was applied.
- 4. Application is specific to the workshop listed.
- 5. The Karen Zorn Memorial Scholarship will distribute a maximum of \$160 per year but the recipient cannot receive more than the cost of the workshop or class. It is available to help members attend workshops, seminars and classes that will further their fiber arts skills.

WE&VING MYTHOLOGY

Arachne was a shepherd's daughter that was particularly skilled at weaving.

Boasting about her skill, she infuriated Athena, who appeared and contested her.

Athena weaved four scenes in which the gods punished those humans that considered themselves equal to gods and committed hubris; Arachne, on the other hand, weaved scenes in which gods abused humans. Arachne's work was clearly better than Athena's; the goddess even more enraged due to what the weaving depicted, threw Hecate's potion onto Arachne, transforming her into a spider and con-
