## **February Guild Meeting**

### PROGRAM:

We are moving the silent auction from May to February so that our snow bird members can participate and are making some changes that we hope will make the day fun.

<u>Silent Auction</u>—this will be conducted as we have in the past with items from our choosing placed out for each person to make their bid. Bidding will be conducted for a specific amount of time and out -bidding a previous bid is allowed. The guild will keep all the profits.

<u>Auction with Possibility of Minimum Bids</u>—the items in this area come from guild stash or are items that you donate. You can place a request for a minimum bid if you want. # Weaving a Transparency with Bobbie Irwin

Friday – Sunday, March 8-10, 2024, 9am

#### **REGISTRATION CLOSES March 1!!**

Cost: \$160 Registration—click here

Limit: 12 people minimum and 14 maximum

Location: Mesa Historical Museum, 2345 N. Horne, Mesa, AZ 85203

Description - Using a variety of inlay techniques, create pictorial patterns on an open weave background. Transparencies have pattern diversity of tapestry, but are easier, faster, and more economical. Transparency's interaction with light gives added dimension. You'll weave two introductory samplers on a linen warp to try numerous inlay techniques and build confidence in conquering common design challenges. You then design and weave your own patterns no artistic skill required). Unorthodox materials and methods are demonstrated/discussed in class, and in longer classes, you may choose to overshot inlay, a fishing line warp, or start a wool scarf in transparency techniques.

4 – shaft looms, 3 days. For all experience levels, including beginners who are familiar with their equipment and basic weaving techniques.

ABOUT BOBBIE IRWIN: I started teaching weaving on a local level in 1976, long before I knew much about weaving, and I've offered classes and programs for guilds, conferences, craft schools, shops, and other venues since 1986. Or me teaching is about sharing. When something exciting happens while I'm weaving, I just can't wait to share it with other weavers! I am thrilled if I can pass along my enthusiasm and see someone go on to create something ar finer than I have done myself. Secretary's Report: Minutes of October 25, 2023 were published in the November 2023 newsletter after board review and corrections. Minutes from Oct 25 were approved. There are no Board meetings in November and December.

Treasurer's Report: Cindy shared her screen with full balance and budget. Annual expenses were \$4,810.00. Total current balance is \$12,986.17 with Zorn at \$700 and operating balance at \$12,286.17. Board approved report.

#### Old Business:

A number of guild members went to the Mayo Clinic together to see the show. The show was beautifully hung and the art director spoke to us briefly. There was a plaque about Telarana Guild, but no one artist was mentioned.

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#### New Business:

\* Scholarship - Trudy asked the Board to approve two scholarship requests for the Transparency workshop in March. The Board approved \$160 for Linda W and Peggy each. The Transparency workshop has 7 current applicants. Lee suggested, and it was agreed, to offer the workshop at Telarana member cost to Desert Weavers. There was a lengthy discussion about whether the guild would entertain subsidizing workshop costs in the future. The Board voted to subsidize workshops if needed.

\* Pueblo Grande Honorarium Budget has awarded Telarana \$100 for our part in demonstrations. The next Pueblo Grande event with demonstrations is March 9 from 9 to 3PM. Contact Nancy W.

\* Donations to the guild – There was a lengthy discussion about the role of the guild when accepting donations from members (many have aged or passed). It was suggested full guild donation could be used for lessons, given to needy members or sold. For donations where the family is hoping for monies, the guild could facilitate advertising. Subject was tabled for further discussion.

\* Nancy explained about February 14's auction at the meeting. Stage One silent auction with items from storage or contributed to event, Stage Two is bidding for priced items and Stage Three is anyone who wants their own table to sell their items with partial \$ donation to guild.

\* Winnie, Nancy and Lee will write about nominations for open committee and board positions.

\* Guild is hoping for anyone who attended Robyn Spady's class who is willing to teach using color chips or wrapping at the March mini sessions guild meeting.

Library – Karen had asked the Board by email for the okay of 2 books. The Board approved the purchase of Mary Meg Atwater Recipe book. The Textile Arts Index out of print requires more discussion. Cindy warned to check library budget for any purchase.

Membership – Karla sent letters to new members. She also spoke of some upcoming events. It was suggested that she provide a write up in the newsletter about any events.
