

Alaska Connection

If you and your friends and family are planning an Alaska cruise this summer and fall, don't miss these two exhibits in Juneau!

Yéil Koowú Átx'i Khaa Sháade Nákhx'i Yán Sákw Jeeyís: Ravenstail Regalia for Future Leaders, opening at the Juneau-

Douglas City Museum on May 3 and running through October 26, 2024, is an exhibit coordinated by Tlingit weaver Wooshkindein Da.áat Lily Hope and will feature the largest known collection of child-size robes, headdresses, and other ceremonial regalia woven in the Ravenstail style. The exhibit will include pieces by Arizona-based Tsimshian weaver and Telaraña member Ksm Lx'sgan Ruth Hallows.

Ravenstail, known as yéil koowú in Tlingit, gadiiłgmwas in Tsimshian Sm'algyax, gwiis maakskw in Nisga'a Sm'algyax, and qwēgal gia't in Xaad Kil/Haida, is a form of geometric finger-twined weaving on gravity-hung bar looms developed by Northwest Coastal People indigenous to river and coastal waterways of the Pacific Northwest. Its techniques lay dormant for many years after colonization by Russia and the United States, but regained



popularity in Alaska and British Columbia in the 1980s and 90s. Cheryl Samuel worked with indigenous weavers to help revive the practice, traveling the globe to track down the few remaining examples of Ravenstail weaving from the 1700s and 1800s in museums in North America, Europe, and Russia. Cheryl authored a book detailing the few full-size robes that remain from that time period, *The Raven's Tail: Northern Geometric Style Weaving*.

The robes in this exhibit will be danced by elementary school students from the Juneau School District's Tlingit Culture, Language, and Literacy class on April 30, 2024, 5:30 pm (Alaska time), at a multimedia presentation and "gathering of the robes" called The History and Future of Yéil Koowú, Ravenstail Weaving (https://www.lilyhope.com/yeilkoowu). The event will be live-streamed; you can check Lily Hope's social media accounts on Facebook or Instagram (@lilyhopeweaver) for updates.



Our own Ksm Lx'sgan Ruth Hallows was recognized Best of Ravenstail Weaving at SHI's JAS in 2022. Her Chilkat weaving will be included in this year's exhibition.


What one book would YOU like to have with you this summer? Fellow Guild Members responded:

Secretary's Report: Minutes of March 27 had been reviewed by members and corrected. Lee moved and Winnie seconded that Minutes be approved. Minutes approved by all.

Treasurer's Report: Cindy presented the balance of \$3527.36 in checking, \$10,000 in CD for summer and \$380 in Zorn Scholarship funds. Linda W reminded Cindy to correct scholarship as income. Cindy suggested it was time for an audit. Carol offered to check on a member who could perform the audit.

Old Business: AZ Fiber Festival was a big hit. Thanks to Paula, Lee and Winnie for preparing and manning the guild's booth. Special thanks to Nancy Munier for stepping up to help. Festival was well received. Winnie stated that guild photos, book of our shows and napkin exchange samples were of great interest. Paula said the Federation plans are for a fiber festival every 2 years and they know now to start planning earlier and have many more volunteers to help run things.

New Business: Telarana has 2 new workshop committee chairpersons – Jean Lavell and Judith Emerson.

Thanks to our new chairs and many thanks to Deb Barr and Marcia Wenbert who are stepping down.

Committee Reports:

Demonstrations – Nancy W. had Karla tell us about the excitement Farm Day at the zoo. People were interested in the sheep, wool processing, spinning. Nancy Munier did weaving demonstrations. Karla also reminded the board of the Earth Day demonstrations that would happen Saturday, April 27. Desert Weavers would be demonstrating also.

Exhibition/ Shows — Cindy explained that the committee has been expanded with Winnie and Carol joining. Maureen is stepping down after doing fabulous work arranging our programs at 3 different venues. Many thanks to Maureen. Cindy has created a Shuttlefly book with photos of our shows. Carol is eager to use the book as a resume when seeking new opportunities. Cindy will send a email to guild members who may be interested in the book also. Two books will go in the guild library.

The committee has had contact with someone at Sky Harbor Airport about a gallery show in the future.

The committee is exploring the theme "Here and There" for the future show and encourage guild members to start working on fiber art pieces for the show which will hopefully happen 2025 or 2026.

The Board discussed having the annual guild sale Dec 14 because of conflicts with the Nov 30 and Dec 7 dates. Lee will ask the church about availability.
